George Lee

George "Big Daddy" Lee, will be known as one of New Jersey's greatest players. In 1958, a 6'4" physically endowed sophomore entered Trenton High and was immediately picked by Coach Price to lead the boys basketball team to future glory. George was incredibly strong, shy and had raw talent. He would go on in the next three years to establish basketball records in many categories. He was the first Trenton Central player to score 1,000 career points, and amass 1,000 + career rebounds. George was a three-time All-City player, an unprecedented two-time first team All-State player, and voted the N.J. Player of The Year. He was also the only Trenton basketball player ever named as a prestigious Dell Magazine All-American, and selected to play in All-American games at different spots in the country. George's high school career was truly history making and remarkable. In recognition of his achievements at Trenton Central High School, his number 42 was retired alongside his teammate and life-long friend, Tal Brody.

George continued his education at St. John's University before joining the US Army. After being honorably discharged, George sat on the Board of Selective Service. He played semi-pro basketball and was given a try-out with the NY Knicks, where he suffered a serious knee injury which would dampen his dreams of playing in the NBA. He came back to play in the Eastern Basketball league for several seasons for franchises in Trenton and Sundbury, Pa. George was employed by General Motors where he became the youngest floor manager. He retired in 1997. George passed in 2014, and is survived by his loving and devoted wife, Agnes Lee; his daughter Serita Lee; a grandson, Deron.



Harold Driver

Harold Driver was a 1974 graduate of Hopewell Valley High School where he earned varsity letters in Basketball, Soccer & Track. In 1974, he became the all-time leading scoring at HVCHS, a record that he still holds, with 1,420 points. He held that same record, at the time in Mercer County, as well. He was named 1st team All League, All Suburban, and All Area. As a multi-sport athlete he also still holds the long jump record that was set in 1974, a jump of 22'4 and he was inducted into Hopewell Valley Hall of Fame 2001

Driver is Quinnipiac's all-time leader in rebounds with 1,147, Harold Driver is ranked fifth all-time in scoring with 1,813 points, fifth with 755 field goals, tenth with 303 free throws and tied for fourth with 112 games played. Driver, the ECAC Rookie of the Year in 1975, was named second team College Division All-American, Associate Press honorable mention All-American, ECAC All-East and All-New England as a sophomore. Over his last two seasons, Driver's success continued as he led his team with 13.4 points and 9.3 rebounds per game as a junior and 18.4 points and 10.6 boards per contest as a senior.

Upon graduation from Quinnipiac, Harold played in the CBA with the Lancaster Red Roses for almost two seasons before heading overseas to Venezuela (two seasons) to continue the pursuit of his professional dream. Driver had three NBA tryouts invites and tryouts, two with the Sixers and one with the Portland Trailblazers. After her continued to play for a few more years abroad in Argentina & the Philippines.

After his basketball pursuits were over, Harold settled back home and stepped into the emerging IT world where he has been since the mid 80's. Driver currently works for Albridge Solutions, a BNY Mellon Company, where he manages the overnight Data Operations teams.

Driver was blessed with two sons, Maurice & Justin; who are embarking and following their own dreams and goals in business. He is engaged to Michelle Dixon, and they will be married September of this year. Driver currently resides in Moorestown, NJ, a place where he is able to see his biggest fan, his mom, Dorothy Mason.



Tonya Grant Brown

Tonya was born on October 25, 1967, in Trenton, NJ and comes from a loving family of six siblings and a mother of whom she adores, Mary Williams. Tonya also has a daughter of her own, 14 year old Kalynn Brown, her pride and joy. Tonya was approximately 8 years old when her interest and love of basketball began. Her Uncle Jim and her big brother, Greg were the first to introduce her to the game and the rest is history in the making.

Fast forward to high school where her basketball career was on a clear take off path at Trenton Central High School (TCHS) from 1982-1985. During her sophomore year, she started junior varsity and averaged 12 points per game. For her junior and senior years at TCHS, she started for the varsity girls team, the Tornadoes. She was named to the First Team All-CVC team during her Junior and Senior year at TCHS. She went on to help lead the Tornadoes in 1985 to a Central Jersey Group IV championship and capture the Mercer County Tournament Crown as well. Tonya averaged 18.0 points during her senior year at TCHS.

She was awarded a full athletic scholarship to Saint Peter's College (now Saint Peter's University) in Jersey City, New Jersey where she played from 1986-90. She is the Peacocks, women's basketball team all-time leading scorer with 2,020 points and fourth leading rebounder with 964 boards.

Tonya was named to the MAAC's 25th Anniversary Team in 2006. She is currently the MAAC's fifth all-time leading scorer, tied for sixth in per game average at 18.0 points per game, fifth with a .542 field goal percentage, and 13th with 964 career rebounds. She was an ALL-MAAC selection all four years of her career, including a two-time first team choice (1988-89, 1989-90), and was chosen as MAAC Player of the Year in 1990. She scored a Saint Peter's record 716 points as a senior, averaging 25.6 points per game, also a school record. During her career at Saint Peter's, she led the Peacocks to a 79-33 record. She was inducted into the Saint Peter's Hall of Fame in 1996. Additional accolades for Tonya included, being named to the second district All-Kodak Team in 1985 and also the New Jersey College Player of The Year in 1985. Tonya graduated in 1990 from Saint Peter's College with a Bachelors of Arts Degree in Sociology and a Minor in Urban Studies.

Upon graduation, her professional career in basketball began overseas and lasted for 10 impressive years. She graced her skills in Switzerland, Spain and Israel, where she led the league in scoring for multiple seasons.

She became a valuable substitute teacher for the Trenton Board of Education from 1990-2000, which gave her a perspective and desire to continue work with students. Also employed by Emily Fisher Charter School, under the direction of Mr. Dallas Dixon, Tonya was the Assistant Headmaster of the school from 2000-2012. Here, she diligently taught Character Education and mentored “at risk” students on a daily basis. She immersed herself in the administrative duties of the school and truly had a passion for making a difference in these young people’s lives.

Tonya is currently the Head Girls Basketball Coach at the Solebury School in New Hope, PA. She recently completed her 7th season with the Lady Spartans. Since her tenure with the Solebury School Girls Basketball Team, she is fast approaching her 100th career win and cannot wait for it to come to fruition. Named Solebury Coach of the Year in 2015, she led the Lady Spartans to 2 consecutive Penn Jersey Championships in 2015 and 2016.

She is employed full-time at the Trenton Housing Authority as the Coordinator of Recreation. She assists area youth in various recreational activities, as well as provides services to the senior citizens within the Housing Authority.

Tonya Grant- Brown Paying It Forward Enterprise, Inc. (PIFE)

Finally, Tonya is the passionate Founder/CEO/President of **Paying It Forward Enterprise, Inc.(PIFE)**. PIFE was established in 2014. She truly believes that “Paying it Forward” is beneficial to every inner city youth that strives for success within themselves. Tonya has maintained a partnership with the Boys and Girls Clubs of America (BGCA) and more recently united with The City of Trenton and the Mercer County Prosecutor’s office to service area youth.

She directs all of the BGCA coed basketball leagues and clinics from September through June for children ages 7-13 years old. PIFE serves approximately 200 children throughout Mercer county. In addition, she manages a girls basketball league every summer servicing girls from the following NJ areas: Trenton, Ewing, Hamilton, South Brunswick, Princeton, Willingboro and Hightstown.

PIFE also has a partnership with the Stuart Country Day School and has successfully recommended various inner-city players to the school’s Athletic program.

PIFE in the past, provided a \$500 scholarship to a recipient who was a former player of the league and who was accepted and planned to attend college on a full Athletic Basketball Scholarship. This scholarship was given to the one recipient along with other notable prizes and trophies given to others for their participation in the program. This year’s recipient will be announced in August 2019 at the closing ceremonies for the summer program.

Keeping people warm and students prepared for education, PIFE has also held coat and book bag drives each year giving back to the community. “Paying It Forward” is truly Tonya’s life journey and there is no stopping her drive and desire to help others along the way.



Mark G. Bass

Mark Bass, was one of the most prolific shooters in Saint Joseph's history, and has just completed his 20th season at his alma mater and is the longest tenured assistant coach in SJU men's basketball history.

Bass joined the Hawks' staff in 1999-2000 and during his tenure, has been involved with teams that have made six consecutive post-season appearances, won five Atlantic 10 regular-season titles and captured the 2016 and 2014 A-10 titles. Nine years after he led the Hawks to the NIT Final as a player in 1996, Bass again helped SJU reach New York City and the NIT Final as a coach in 2005.

In 2005, Bass was honored with the William J. Bennett Memorial Award, recognizing dedication and loyalty to the Saint Joseph's men's basketball program. He was a co-recipient of the award with then-fellow staff member Monté Ross.

A fiery leader on the court, and two-year team captain, Bass led the Hawks to the NIT Finals in his senior season, 1995-96, and ranked second on the team with his average of 14.3 points per game. He connected for school records of 91 3-pointers and 268 attempts, season marks which were later eclipsed by Pat Carroll in 2005. A Second Team All-Big 5 selection in 1996, Bass made 225 three-pointers during his career from 1992-96, a total that now ranks sixth on the Hawks' all-time list. As a freshman in the 1992-93 season, the guard led the Atlantic 10 Conference in free throw percentage with a school-record 86.9 percent. Bass also led the A-10 in three-point percentage as a junior (.423), making him just the second Saint Joseph's player to lead the league in two different categories.

In 2001, Bass became the first member of the 1996 NIT Finalist team to be inducted into the Saint Joseph's Basketball Hall of Fame.

Upon graduation he played one season of professional basketball with the Tianjin Breakers in the Chinese Professional League in 1996-97. Following that, he served two seasons (1997-99) as an assistant coach under Max Good at Maine Central Institute, helping guide the team to back-to-back New England Prep School Championships, including a perfect 35-0 season in 1997-98.

A 1991 graduate of McCorristin High School, Bass was named the Mercer County Player of the Year as a senior and set the all-time scoring record with 1,486 points in his career. He was a two time state champion and was named 1st team All CVC, All Mercer County, All Area and 3rd team All State. Bass also received the prestigious Jack Cryan Award in 1991. He was inducted into the Mercer County CYO Hall of Fame in November, 2004.



David "Poppy" Sanderson

David "Poppy" Sanderson, his name is associated with so many exceptional and positive things done for Trenton. That's why he has been honored by groups such as the Delaware Valley Chapter of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame from which he received the Contribution to Amateur Athletic Award, the Trenton Select Committee and now the Mercer County Basketball Hall of Fame.

One of Sanderson's favorite subjects is his Education Outweighs Them All project, for as much as he loves sports, he knows how to keep things in perspective. Sports and community are running themes through Sanderson's life.

A former nationally ranked PAL boxer in the 1960s, Sanderson grew up to be on the Board of Governors of the Trenton PAL. Trenton PAL was one of the biggest influences in his life. A product of the Trenton public schools, Sanderson received a Special Service Award from the Trenton PAL. In addition to that service award he has also received awards from The National Congress of Black Women Honoree (2017) an award from the City of Trenton Outstanding Contribution to Sports Fitness/Wellness Award (2015) and a Lifetime Achievement Award (2015) from the Colonial Valley Conference Coaches Association, to name a few.

After attending North Carolina AT&T University, he returned home. Since 1974 he has been employed by the Trenton Board of Education. He has also been a head athletic trainer for the Champale Professional Softball and the Trenton Flames ABA teams as well as for the Prime Time Basketball Classic. Since 1995, he has been the head athletic trainer for the NBA Players Association Top 100 High School Basketball Camp.

In addition to touching the lives of countless athletes hailing from Trenton High as well as their opponents, Sanderson has also influenced the world of athletic trainers by guiding and inspiring those coming up the ladder.

A devoted family man, Sanderson has been honored by The Trentonian Club (Distinguished Person Award) and the Trenton Board of Ed (Wall of Hero's Award) among countless others.



Fred B. Dumont

Fred B. Dumont is a 44 year member of IAABO Board #193. He passed the IAABO exam in November of 1974 and became a member in the 1975/1976 season. In 1982, Fred was elected to Board #193's Executive Committee where he served 3 consecutive terms, a total of nine years. In 1991, Fred was elected President of Board #193, a position he held for 20 consecutive years. During this time, he served as a delegate to New Jersey State Board #1. Fred served as President to Board #1 on four different occasions. Fred was a delegate to IAABO's convention for 20 years. In 2004, President Lou DeGeorge appointed him to the Nomination Committee. He served on several other committees' including the Rules Examination, Budget/Auditing and Women's Coordinating.

In 2006, the NJSIAA named Fred the Boys Basketball Official of the Year. In 2007, Board #193 presented him with the Joe Logue Award and in 2010; the Colonial Valley Conference presented Fred with their first Basketball Official of the Year award. He was named the CVC Official of the Year again in 2018; the only official presented this award on two occasions.

Fred officiated in the NJSIAA Tournament for 39 years. During this time, he officiated 33 times in the championship rounds (sectional, state semi-final, state finals or Tournament of Champions). Fred also officiated in the Mercer County Tournament since its inception and he was selected to ref the Championship game on 19 occasions. In 2018, Fred was inducted into the Mercer County CYO Hall of Fame honoring his referee career.

Fred Dumont retired as the Business Manager for Insulators Local Union #89 on July 31, 2018. He currently serves on the New Jersey Economic Development Authority and as Labor Liaison for New Jersey Senate President Steve Sweeney. Fred lives in Hamilton with his wife Robynn. He has a daughter, Candice & her husband Mike, son Fred & his wife Alisha and son Joseph. Fred is the proud grandfather of Declan, Ascher, Finn and Carter Osmond and; Fred, Dean and Dominic Dumont.

Fred takes pride in his stepson Chris Filippone and; his wife Allison, their daughters Julia and Anna and stepdaughter Cheryl Filippone.



Dale Hodges

Dale Hodges is native of Trenton, New Jersey and a graduate of Trenton Central High School. Ms. Hodges is currently a Certified Health and Physical Education for the New York City Department of Education. She has been a teacher for 13 years. Ms. Hodges also serves as the General Manager of the Youth Basketball League in Queens, New York. Prior to becoming a teacher Ms. Hodges was a professional basketball player, playing internationally in several countries: Spain, Italy, Japan, South Korea, France, Russia and the United States of America. She was drafted by the New England Blizzard of the American Basketball League in the first round as the seventh overall pick. In addition, Ms. Hodges has coached for over 20 years at elementary, middle school, high school and collegiate the level, making stops at University of Massachusetts, Drexel University and Fordham University as an assistant coach and serving as head coach at Arcadia University in Pennsylvania and Rutgers-Camden in New Jersey. Ms. Hodges is a graduate of St. Joseph's University, Pa., where she was a 1st Team Consensus All – American her senior year in college, to this day she still holds over 30 school records for the women's basketball team. She is the first women's basketball player in school's history to have her jersey, number 44, retired. Upon graduation, Ms. Hodges obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology. She also holds a Master's Degree in Multicultural Education from Eastern University located in St. David's, Pennsylvania.

While at Trenton Central High School, she was a three Time 1st Team High School Girls All Mercer County, 1983 -84, 1984-85, and 1985-86. She was 2nd Team Parade Magazine High School Girls All- American in 1986, and 1st Team All State High School Girls Basketball Team of New Jersey, in 1986. During her collegiate run at St. Joseph's Ms. Hodges was a Two Time Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year, 1988-89, 89-90, a Three Time 1st Team Atlantic 10 Conference Player of the Year, 1987-88, 1988-89, 1989-90, a Two Time Big 5 Player of the Year, 1988-89, 1989-90 and a Three Time 1st Team All Big 5. Dale has been inducted in the Big 5 Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 1996, inducted in the St. Joseph's University Women's Basketball Hall of Fame 1999 and inducted in the Atlantic 10 Conference Legends in 2014.



Shelly Dearden

The name Michele “Shelly” Dearden is synonymous with township of Ewing. She has been a mainstay of the Mercer County area as an athlete, coach, and mentor. Her accomplishments are numerous and her accolades are well-noted. Being inducted into the Mercer County Basketball Hall of Fame is an esteemed honor for the Mercer County native who’s celebrated career has now spanned nearly 40 years.

By the time she graduated from Ewing High School in 1981, Shelly had become one of the most decorated sports figures to roam the halls. She was a dedicated three-sport athlete in soccer, basketball, and softball, the school’s first 1,000 point scorer, and All-State, All-Area, and All-County selection in basketball and soccer. During her senior season, she also played in the prestigious North versus South All-Star Basketball Game. In addition to these accolades for soccer and basketball, she was also an All-County honoree for softball and honored as The Athlete of the Year.

Shelly would go on to continue her athletic career at nearby Trenton State College (now TCNJ), where she would become the school’s fourth 1,000 point scorer in basketball, lead her team to a “Final 8” appearance, and play in the College All-Star Game. Additionally, her softball teams were always in the hunt for a national championship. Her team won the title once, while also being a national runner up on three other trips.

As a coach in the Mercer County area for years, her depth of experience is extraordinary. Before returning to her high school alma-mater full-time, she spent time in the college coaching ranks as a basketball assistant coach and volleyball head coach at Rider University. She also spent time at Mercer County Community College as a soccer and softball head coach. While with Mercer in 1996, she was named Coach of the Year for Soccer and had a team finish ranked sixth nationally. In her return to Ewing, Dearden was a JV softball and JV soccer coach before taking the reigns as the girls soccer head coach in 1989. Over her seven years as the Girls Head Soccer Coach, Shelly amassed seven CVC League titles, one Mercer County title, four NJSIAA Sectional titles, and a NJSIAA State Championship title in 1991. Shelly returned to the hardwood in 1988 where she spent 14 years as the Girls Basketball Head Coach. During that time her teams were dominant and displayed all the characteristics that made her the successful athlete she had been. Nine 1,000 point scorers, five CVC League titles, three Mercer County titles, four more NJSIAA Sectional titles, and another NJSIAA State Championship title (1999), Dearden was now becoming synonymous with two things, Ewing and winning.

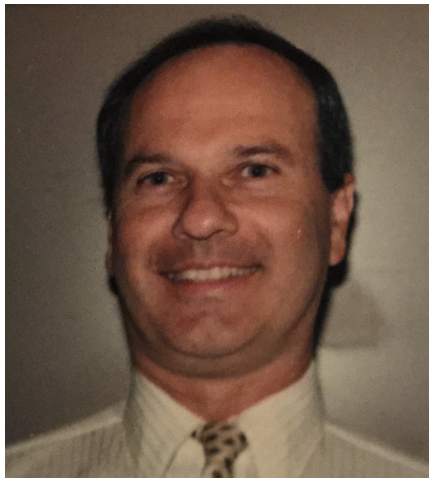
Dearden has continued to pace the sidelines of the hardwood, but since 2004, it has been with the Boys' Basketball Program. Currently, she is the only woman coaching boys in the state of New Jersey and one of a handful nationally. Her boys teams have embodied Ewing tradition and toughness. After 15 years, she has coached four 1,000 point scorers, her teams have amassed nine CVC league titles, one Mercer County title, six NJSIAA Sectional titles, and an NJSIAA State Championship title in 2012. With that 2012 state championship, Shelly became the only coach in the country to have won three state championships in three different sports and the first woman to win both a girls and boys state championships in basketball.

Shelly has also been recognized for her endless contributions as a coach and leader in the Mercer County Community. She was named NJSIAA Coach of the Year twice and Mercer County Coach of the Year on multiple occasions by the Star-Ledger, Trenton Times, Trentonian, and NJ.com. She has also received numerous acknowledgments of her coaching achievements from the New Jersey State Assembly, Mercer County, and Ewing Township. She started the Mercer "33" Girls Soccer Awards Banquet along with the Girls Summer League at Moody Park. Additionally, she is a Father Clearance O'Shea award winner, Ewing Hall of Fame Inductee, Mercer County Softball Hall of Fame Inductee, and a Trenton Select award winner. Shelly also started the Colonial Valley Conference Basketball Coaches Organization which honors players, coaches, referees, and local organizations at the conclusion of each basketball season. She was secretary of the organization for one year and has been President for the last nine. Shelly's accomplishments are not only known to the county or state, but nationally as she has been acknowledged by *Sports Illustrated* in their

"Faces in the Crowd" article, in "Inside Jersey", and on ABC6 News for her accomplishments as a trailblazing woman's coach across boys and girls sports.

Within all of her successes as a coach and player lies a person who is also deeply dedicated to the community. Her community service ranges from time spent with the recreation and travel leagues for soccer, baseball, and basketball. She was also a member of the Commission Board for the Recreation Department in Ewing. In recent years, she has established herself as the Creator and Director of the Ewing Recreation Basketball Camp for children in fourth to eighth grade and has been a guest speaker at various other camps and organizations in the Mercer County Area. Additionally, her teams have volunteered time at various Halloween, Christmas, and Special Olympic events to build positive youth interaction, leadership skills, and teach the young men and women of Ewing what it means to give back to their community.

Her growing family is in fact her proudest achievement. She and her husband, John, have been married for 31 years and have raised three amazing sons, Kevin, Keith, and Kasey. Keith and his wife, Katie, were married in 2017 and recently welcomed Shelly's first grandson, Duke Christopher, to the Dearden family. Kasey and his fiancée, Kellyann, were engaged this year.



Jackie Adams

Jack Adams' playing days began at the CYO for St. Mary's from 1959-1963, while playing for an undefeated team, that won a full league championship he also won multiple MVPs. From St. Mary's Jack went to Cathedral High School where he was Co Captain on the Varsity team from 1966-1967. Jack led Cathedral to the 1966-67 Parochial State Championship and is one of the greatest scorers in Cathedral and Mercer County High School history ending with, 1099 points. He was a Newark News All State and All Group First Team selection in 1966-1967.

Jack continued his academic and athletic career at Holy Cross College in Worcester, Massachusetts on a full athletic scholarship for basketball. While at Holy Cross, he was a starting guard from 1968-1971, and ended his career with 921 points. During the Marshal Invitational Tournament in 1969, he was named to the All Tournament team. He then co-captained the Varsity Basketball Team from 1970-1971, and received the 1971 Crusader of the Year Award. At the end of his career he was also awarded the Student Athlete Award presented by the Holy Cross Varsity Club. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Holy Cross in English and upon his graduation he attended the University of Miami (Fla.) School of Law in Coral Gables, Florida and graduated with a J.D. (Doctor of Law) Degree in 1974. He is a member of the New Jersey and Florida Bars and he has retired as a Deputy Attorney General in 2015.

Jack Adams was previously inducted into the Mercer County CYO Hall of Fame in 2004. He is happily married to Marylou Adams and they have two children John and Jennifer, and now two grandsons Henry Adams and Dominic Bernardi.

GEORGE O'GORMAN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP



The Scholarship is named for George O'Gorman, the long-time legendary sportswriter of the Trentonian who passed away in August of 2018. He is noted and remembered for his coverage of all high school sports but most notably girls basketball, football, and soccer. He was also a broadcaster for WBCB 1040 radio.

The George O'Gorman Memorial Scholarship is presented to a deserving senior who is a member of a Colonial Valley Conference school or Mercer County prep school as selected by the Mercer County Basketball Hall of Fame committee. George was the type of sports writer that wanted to highlight the underdog player, the type of player that did the little things for a team that was seldom noticed by the casual fan. Someone that had a great attitude, a work horse and always found a way to contribute. We are honoring a player that may not be the star of a team, but someone it would be hard to imagine winning games without her.



Leah Johnson

Leah, a three-year varsity basketball player at Notre Dame, captained the team during the 2018-19 season. Leah's leadership carried the Irish to an 18-9 record as she was easily recognized for her scrappy play, fiery personality, and will to win. Leah credits her desire to improve and her attention to detail for the role she played at Notre Dame. Charged with many responsibilities that don't appear in the stat sheets, Leah embraced those responsibilities throughout her career. Although she averaged 12.8 points and 3.8 steals per game this season, Leah always prioritized team accomplishments over personal ones. Leah will continue her academic and basketball career at West Chester University of PA in the fall. She currently lives in Columbus, NJ, with her brother, Mark and her parents, Mark and Rose Johnson.

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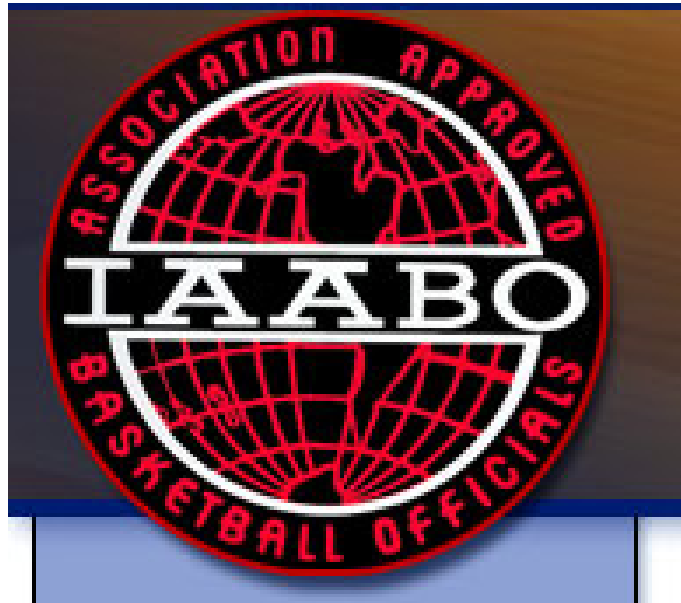

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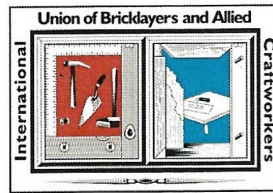
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
